When we compare two objects, we add **-er** to the adjective and use **than** after it.



For some long adjectives, we do not add **-er**. Instead, we use the word **more** before them.

When we compare three or more objects, we add **-est** to the adjective. We always use **the** with this form. We do not use than.



When the adjective is a long word, we do not add **-est** to the adjective. Instead, we use the words **the most** before the adjective.
